To do this, start depositing and draining freshStrawberries. These berries tend to leave behind their upper leaves, so they don't have to hug like red strawberries. They can then be refrigerated for about an hour in the fridge (which makes them frozen faster) and then rolled into the freezer. Or you can do what is called a "dry packet", where you sprinkle them lightly with sugar and then freeze them. Sugar will help them keep their color and protect them from burning the freezer. Freeze them on a small plate or in a plate. Once frozen, transfer them to a plastic freezer bag or container that can be tightly sealed. If some fruit is left on the plant at that time, it tends to be really underdeveloped or you get frost damage. I take that fruit from the bushes and bury it in the nearby ground. These plants often sprout new ones in the spring, so make sure to leave some room for development. To mulch the berry plants, get some nice clean hay (straw), or a good pile of leaves from your trees and bury the plants well. You want a nice pile that will not wash away in the rain and that will keep the snow.
