Tools and Annie Schlechter If you're considering a kitchen renovation, it's time to think beyond backsplashes, countertops, or cabinet finishes. Right now, it's all about installing not one, but two dishwashers. Designers are seeing an uptick in double dishwasher requests from clients who are striving for a life of convenience, and you're going to want in. There's the obvious advantages to having a second dishwasher—one being that you can get two loads done at once—and then the perks you might not have thought of, like this trick from designer Patrick Sutton: "You can use them as designated clean and dirty machines without having to empty them. Use the clean dishes from one and fill the other with dirty dishes until it's full, then run it and switch." This will certainly save you countertop space during holiday party season. If now you're thinking about how badly you need this, or are simply intrigued by the thought of two dishwashers, House Beautiful spoke with Sutton and two other designers who've seen the double appliances on the rise. Here are their tips you need to know, and why people are loving the idea. Your kitchen doesn't need to be massive to have two dishwashers. Sutton says that a dishwasher is the equivalent of a two-foot wide base cabinet, so if you have that amount of space, you can generally install two dishwashers. If you're tight on space, a dish drawer will do the trick. Even in a smaller space, designer Alison Pickart says there are options. "Dish drawers can be a fantastic alternative to the full height models that tend to take up an entire bank of cabinetry. They can be paneled and will fit right above another deep storage drawer," she says. And if you're not sold on the idea of a drawer, designer Tom Stringer suggests the Miele 18" wide slimline dishwasher as an alternative. A second dishwasher could be cheaper than a cabinet. It goes without saying that including this in your kitchen redesign might feel like a splurge, but Stringer has workarounds. "We'll often use a less expensive model for the location most likely to receive pots and pans, and we've found that many times, the second dishwasher is less expensive than the cabinet it would replace." It's entirely about making life easier. Having two washers isn't meant to be flashy or over-the-top. It's all about convenience, each designer says. "Life is busy and families move quickly. So many things in life can knock you out of plumb. As you roll on, focused on your life, along comes some crazy thing that slams you - and suddenly you find yourself askew. Many traditions of meditative practice use the term "centered" to describe the state of presence, peace, and stillness. Another that I have found useful is that of being plumb. When something is plumb, it's in perfect alignment - inline, perpendicular to the ground. It's easy to imagine ourselves as plumb, standing up straight, when we're at peace and in flow. When we're stressed, we tend to slouch, and there's a general feeling of being "crooked." When I begin feeling out of plumb, I picture a slowly swaying plumb bob. As it begins to slow down and stop, I feel more at peace and aligned: Take a deep breath and let it out. If convenient, close your eyes. Imagine a plumb bob, gently swinging back and forth. Next, picture the plumb bob, slowly coming to a rest. Finally, see the plumb bob, stopped in perfect alignment, straight and still. When I first began using this technique, I would close my eyes and imagine the plumb bob, while moving my eyes back and forth. It was like watching a pendulum, and the gentle swaying and final resting at plumb would bring me back to the present moment. As I began to use it more often, I found that just picturing the plumb bob would calm me down in most situations. But I find that I still use the full technique in really stressful circumstances. Anything is more stable and structurally sound when it's plumb. Finding a way to bring ourselves back to that place of stillness and presence will ensure that we too, remain structurally sound. Yet another study weighs in on the most efficient way to clean dirty dishes. The debate over washing dishes by hand vs. using a dishwasher has been raging on TreeHugger since its inception. In the earliest article I could find from 2005, the dishwasher came out the clear winner, with researchers from the University of Bonn saying it uses only half the energy and one-sixth the water. Fifteen years later, we're still talking about it, and a new study published in the journal Environmental Research Communications shows not much has changed. Dishwashers still take the prize for efficiency, both in terms of energy and water used, but there are better and worse ways of using it, and of washing dishes by hand. The findings are interesting because kitchen cleanup is something we do every day, so why not learn the optimal way? Forty participants were asked first to load and run a dishwasher and then to wash dishes by hand the way they would at home. They answered survey questions afterward about their dishwashing behaviors. Three other participants were then asked to load a dishwasher and wash dishes by hand following best practices. This meant not pre-rinsing dishes before loading in the dishwasher and using the recommended normal cycle with heated dry, rinse-aid, and high-quality detergent. The machines were assumed to be fully loaded, as 93 percent of participants reported being able to do this regularly. For washing dishes, this meant using the two-basin method "where dishes are soaked and scrubbed in hot water, rinsed in cold water, and are air-dried." These 'best practices' differ from typical dishwashing behaviors. Most people use "sub-optimal loading patterns" and pre-rinse their dishes before loading into a dishwasher. They also run the tap while washing by hand, which wastes significant amounts of water, and rinse with hot water. The researchers found that these typical practices produce "5,620 and 2,090 kg of greenhouse gas emissions respectively based on washing 4 loads (8 place settings per load) a week for 10 years." So the dishwasher was less than half as bad as hand-washing, even when improper techniques were used. When it comes to water usage, the benefits of dishwashers continue. Over the course of ten years, a dishwasher will use 16,300 gallons of water, 99.8 percent of which comes from daily use, not production; whereas, washing the same quantity of dishes by hand for ten years will use 34,200 gallons. Learning proper techniques could go a long way toward improving one's footprint: "If manual dishwashers switched from typical to recommended practices, they could reduce emissions by 249 percent." The resulting greenhouse gas emissions from the recommended two-basin method were only 1,610 kg over 10 years. But that's not a whole lot less than a properly-run dishwasher at 2,090 kg, which suggests that using a dishwasher - especially if you're factoring in the cost of your time - really sounds like the way to go. (It is important to note that the study was conducted with help from Whirlpool, a major dishwasher manufacturer, who contributed the research space at its headquarters in Michigan and provided the sample machines; and its employees were the ones asked to demonstrate loading machines - something at which they may be better than the average person.
