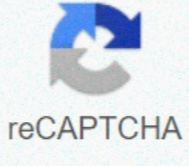




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How to file a missing persons report australia

About 38,000 missing persons reports are received by police each year across Australia. While most of those missing people are found within a short period of time, there are about 2,600 people who have been missing for more than three months. In Australia, a missing person is anyone who has been reported missing to police whose whereabouts are unknown, and where there are fears for their safety or concern for their welfare. About one third of missing persons go missing more than once, and each time a person goes missing it is treated as an individual report. While anyone (regardless of gender, age, ethnicity or educational background) can become a missing person, adults are more likely to be missing long-term. Of the 38,000 missing persons reports submitted to police each year 19,000 or 50% relate to those aged between the years 13 - 17. Other at-risk groups of going missing within our community include: Children and young people Those suffering a mental illness, or depression The elderly and those living with dementia Persons expressing suicidal thoughts Those living with an intellectual or physical disability or without lifesaving medication. There are many reasons people go missing and can include mental illness, miscommunication, misadventure, domestic violence, and being a victim of crime. If you have any concern for the safety and welfare of someone and their whereabouts are unknown you can report them as missing to your local police. You DO NOT have to wait 24 hours to report someone missing. Going missing is not a crime. If you have been reported as missing it means that someone is concerned about your safety and welfare. You can contact Crime Stoppers or police to let them know you are safe and well and your privacy will be maintained. When located, a missing person must give permission before their whereabouts are released or disclosed to their family. In the case of a located missing child, information and decisions regarding their circumstances and their location may be made in consultation with relevant agencies. The National Missing Persons Coordination Centre (NMPCC) is funded by the Federal Government through the AFP. Its mission is to reduce the incidence and impact of missing persons and to educate the Australian community about this significant issue. Visit the National Missing Persons Coordination Centre website. Missing Persons Every day in New South Wales, 22 people are reported missing. For their family and friends the wait for contact or information can be agonising. The good news however is that the NSW Police Missing Persons Unit is here to help find your loved one. Ninety-nine percent of missing people reported to the Unit are located, often thanks to the assistance of those who report them missing. Take 'time out' to collect your thoughts so you can start us looking in the right direction. When you go to a police station to file a missing persons report it will help us if you bring along the following information: a recent photograph of the missing person. a list of the names, addresses and phone numbers of friends and associates. likely destinations eg: favourite places, work locations or places with past connections. any medical requirements or medications they need. a full description of the missing person including height, weight, colour of eyes and hair, bank account details. It is important for people to be aware that going missing is not a crime and that it is the aim of the New South Wales Police Service to ascertain if the missing person is safe and well. Our DutyThe NSW Police Service will undertake investigations to find all persons reported missing where there are concerns for that person's welfare. The Missing Persons Unit will assist in the coordination of all missing persons inquiries. Have you seen these people? Do you have family or friends who have disappeared? Who have vanished leaving no point of contact or explanation? Do you know of people who have disappeared? In 1998 alone more than 7000 people were reported missing in New South Wales, and more than 27,000 Australia wide. Sixty per cent of people reported missing are under the age of 18. Go to page... Who will help you? There are many agencies that specialise in finding missing people. These agencies have national and international contacts. The people who work at these agencies understand how you feel. Some of them actually experienced the trauma of having someone they care about go missing. They want to help you. They all work as a team. They share information and work tirelessly to find each missing person. If you have concerns for someone's safety and welfare, and their whereabouts is unknown, you can file a missing person's report at your local police station. If you have any information on a missing person call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000. Report to police As soon as someone's whereabouts is unknown and there is concern for their safety and welfare, they can be reported missing to police. Police will prioritise suspicious cases, missing children, and those with mental illness. Try to file the report in person, and convey the reasons for your concerns (it may help to go with someone who shares your worry). Police must take reports of missing persons - do not accept being sent away. Consider the following as you prepare to report to the police: Download, save and complete: Missing Person Details Form Provide the most appropriate recent photograph(s) and be prepared for them to be used across media. Be completely honest — solid information helps police prioritise. Pass on additional details as they occur to you. Try to establish a good relationship with the police officers handling the case. If applicable, ask police to triangulate their mobile phone (this can only be done if the phone is switched on). Ask that all stations in surrounding areas are alerted via internal communications. Check if the officer in charge has reason to advise against media attention before alerting media. Remember that going missing is not a crime so police cannot make every missing person a priority. And don't overestimate police resources - what you see on TV often isn't realistic. National Missing Persons Coordination Centre National Missing Persons Coordination Centre (NMPCC) is a government-funded body that complements the roles of state and territory police missing persons units. They operate under the Australian Federal Police (AFP) and are the official platform for Australian missing persons. NMPCC has arrangements with Foxtel and Chemist Warehouse to promote awareness. You must request that your loved one is added to their database - it is not automatic. They also have publications like reports and fact sheets regarding a range of issues relevant to missing persons. In the event you've amassed public support via social media, you should also communicate the news to your audience. Pages and accounts can be disabled or removed if/when you see fit. Register Here About MyCity National Missing Persons UnitEvery year approximately 30,000 people are reported missing in Australia - that's one every 18 minutes. While over 95% are located within a month, the impact on families, friends and the missing persons themselves can be devastating. It is important to remember that people go missing for a variety of reasons. In some cases, the person may be escaping from real or perceived family or personal conflict, they may be victims of foul play, whilst others may be asserting their independence or taking time out. Some simply forget to make contact. Going missing is not a crime. The aim of police is to confirm that people reported as missing are safe and well. You do not have to wait 24 hours before reporting a person missing. The National Missing Persons Unit is part of the Australian Federal Police. How you can help Any piece of information can be crucial in resolving a missing person's case. If you have any information that may assist in locating a missing person or would like to report a missing person: -> Contact your local police station -> Contact the National Missing Persons Coordination Centre (1800 000 634) -> Contact Crime Stoppers (1800 333 000) To report a sighting of a missing person: -> Complete the missing persons sighting form. You can choose to give information anonymously if you wish. How to report a missing person You do not need to wait 24 hours to report a missing person. If a person is missing and you have immediate concerns for their welfare, contact ACT Policing immediately on 131 444. Provide police with as much detail as possible including: the day, time and location of when the person was last seen description of the person's appearance when they went missing - including clothing, hair colour, height, weight a recent photo of the person information on what occurred prior to the person going missing last known contact with the person names and contacts of friends and family the missing person frequently associates with any medications or medical conditions the person may have places the person may visit.
