Table Of Content Learner's Permit Process, Requirements, and Restrictions You must be at least 15 years old to get a learner's permit in Indiana but must be enrolled in a driver's education program. If you're not in driver's ed, you must be 16 years old. You must hold your learner's permit for at least 180 days before you can apply for a driver's license. To get a learner's permit in Indiana, you must pass a written knowledge test, provide proof of identity, Social Security number, and Indiana residency, and pass a vision test. You'll need documents proving your identity, Social Security number, Indiana residency, and enrollment in a driver's education program if you're under 16. An Indiana learner's permit looks like a regular driver's license but includes a distinctive marking indicating it's a learner's permit. A permit driver must have a licensed driver at least 25 years old (or 21 if they are a spouse) sitting in the front passenger seat. If the permit holder is driving with a driving instructor, they can supervise. Driver's License Process, Requirements, and Restrictions You can get a driver's license in Indiana at age 16 if you meet the requirements for a full license. A regular driver's license in the state is classified as a Class D license. It allows you to drive personal vehicles such as cars, SUVs, and small, non-commercial trucks. After obtaining a full license at 18, you can drive friends immediately. However, if you are under 18, you must follow specific restrictions related to passenger limitations and driving hours during the first six months. To get an Indiana driver's license, first get a learner's permit by providing the necessary documents and passing a written test. If you're under 18, you must complete a driver education course and hold the permit for at least 180 days. You can take a road test once you've gained sufficient driving experience. Upon passing, you'll receive your probationary license, which has certain restrictions until you're 21. You can skip the education course if you're 18 or older, and the probationary restrictions don't apply. To get a new license in Indiana, you need proof of identity, residency, and legal presence, along with passing the required tests. Check the BMV website for specific document requirements. To change your name on your license, you must provide a marriage certificate, divorce decree, or court order showing the name change, along with your current license and proof of identity. To change your address, provide proof of your new address and update your information online or at a BMV branch. No new photo is required. To get a license with a star (Real ID), provide additional documentation such as proof of citizenship, identity, and residency. Check the BMV website for the complete list of documents. Yes, you can smile in your Indiana driver's license photo, but the expression should be neutral enough for identification purposes. In Indiana, you can get a full driver's license at age 16 after holding a learner's permit and completing the required driving practice. Initial License Age Requirements You can get a learner's permit at age 15 if you are enrolled in a driver's education program. Otherwise, you can get it at 16. Seniors aged 75 and older are required to take a driving test to renew their license. A 16-year-old with a learner's permit can have passengers in the car, but an experienced driver must be in the front passenger seat. The rules for a full license are less restrictive, but there are still limitations during the first six months. Yes, a 17-year-old with a full driver's license can drive with passengers, but they must follow the state's graduated driving laws, including certain restrictions. Yes, you can get a full driver's license at age 18 without having held a learner's permit, but you must pass the written and practical driving tests. Yes, you can get a learner's permit at 15 if enrolled in a driver's education program. No, if you're 18, you do not need to wait six months after getting your permit. You can get your full license as soon as you pass the required tests. Driver's License and Permit Fee and Renewal Cost A standard driver's license costs \$17.50 for people under 75, \$11 for those 75 to 84, and free for those 85 and older. An Indiana learner's permit costs \$9. Replacing a lost or damaged driver's license costs \$9. Renewing a driver's license costs \$17.50. Indiana Driver's License Renewal Process and Requirements You can renew your driver's license online in Indiana if you're eligible. Visit the Indiana BMV website to check eligibility and start the process. Yes, eligible drivers can renew their licenses online through the Indiana BMV's online portal. You can renew your driver's license up to 2 years before its expiration date. You can renew your license by visiting a BMV branch, using a BMV Connect kiosk, or, if eligible, online. You'll need to provide your current license and, depending on your situation, potentially other documentation. If you renew in person, you'll need your current driver's license, proof of identity, Social Security number, and two documents proving Indiana residency. The wait time varies, but if you're applying for a new license, you'll receive it by mail within 14 days after passing all required tests. For renewals, you may receive it sooner. Driver's License Expiry, Suspension, Replacement, and Reinstatement Indiana driver's licenses are valid for six years if you are under 75 years old. If you're 75 to 84, it's valid for three years; if you're 85 or older, it's valid for 2 years. To get a replacement license, you must bring proof of your identity (like a passport or birth certificate), proof of Social Security number, and documents proving your Indiana residency. You can request a replacement at BMV branch or online. Indiana Written Knowledge and Driving Test Yes, you must pass a written knowledge test to get your driver's license in Indiana. This is usually taken when you apply for your learner's permit. The driving test takes 15 to 20 minutes and covers basic driving skills, such as turning, parking, and obeying traffic signs. The Indiana permit test has 50 questions in total. You must answer 42 out of 50 questions correctly to pass the permit test. You need 50 hours of supervised driving practice, including 10 hours at night, before getting your license in Indiana. You'll need documents proving your identity, Social Security number, lawful status, Indiana residency, and passing a vision test. No, Indiana does not allow the written permit test to be taken online. You must take it in person at a BMV branch. Access 150+ road sign questions Out-of-State or Foreign Driver's License If you're moving to Indiana, you can transfer your out-of-state license by visiting the BMV, passing a vision screening, and providing the required documents. You must do this within 60 days of becoming an Indiana resident. Yes, you can drive in Indiana with an out-of-state permit as long as you follow the restrictions of your home state's permit and are accompanied by a licensed adult. There's no limit to how many times you can take the permit test in Indiana, but if you fail, you must wait until the next business day to retake it. If you fail three times, you'll need to wait 60 days before trying again. Commercial Driver's License (CDL) A CDL in Indiana costs around \$35 for the license application. Additional fees may apply for endorsements or skills tests. To get a CDL, you need to get a Commercial Learner's Permit and hold it for 14 days, complete CDL training (optional but helpful), pass the CDL skills test, and pay the applicable fees. Class B allows you to drive vehicles like dump trucks, buses, and large delivery trucks. To get a Class B CDL in Indiana, Pass the Class B knowledge test to get your CLP. Hold the CLP for 14 days. Pass the skills test for Class B vehicles. Apply for your Class B CDL after paying the required fees. Getting an IN Motorcycle License Yes, you need a motorcycle license or an endorsement on your regular driver's license to ride a motorcycle legally in Indiana. It can take a few weeks to get your motorcycle license. You must pass a written test, complete a rider safety course or a skills test, and apply for your license. You can get a motorcycle permit at 15 years old if you enroll in a motorcycle safety course. You must be at least 16 years and 90 days old for a full motorcycle license. First, pass the motorcycle knowledge test to get your permit. Then, either complete a motorcycle safety course or pass the skills test. After that, visit the BMV to apply for your license or add a motorcycle endorsement to your current driver's license. Miscellaneous Yes, a 16-year-old can register a car in their name in Indiana, but they may need a parent or guardian to sign the registration if they're a minor. It depends on where you're starting from. For example, driving from Chicago to Indianapolis takes about 3 hours, while Louisville, KY takes about 2 hours. You'll need your vehicle title, proof of insurance, and a valid ID (usually your driver's license) to register your car in Indiana. You need at least a valid driver's license, moped license, or motorcycle endorsement to drive a moped in Indiana. A chauffeur's license allows you to drive vehicles for hire, like taxis, limousines, or any vehicle with more than 16 passengers. A probationary license is given to drivers under 21 who have completed the permit process. It comes with some restrictions, like limits on nighttime driving and passenger rules. An operator license is a standard driver's license that allows you to operate regular vehicles like cars and small trucks on public roads. You must pass Indiana's written knowledge test when you Apply for a learner's permit Become a new Indiana resident and hold an out-of-country driver's license Let your driver's license expire for more than 180 days Have six or more active points on your driving record and want to renew your driver's license Note that holders of a valid out-of-state driver's license are no longer required to pass the knowledge test. Like many other states, BMV waives the tests if you hold a valid license from another state. BMV bases the Official written knowledge test on information in the driver's manual. The purpose of the test is to make sure you have read the manual and have a good understanding of traffic laws and safe driving practices. Read more: Are the DMV Practice Tests Enough? It is best to arrive at a licensing branch one hour before closing. Otherwise, you will not be allowed to take the test. If you fail the test, you must wait until the next business day before you can retake it. There are 50 multiple choice questions on the Indiana knowledge test. 16 questions are about common road signs and the other 34 questions deal with safe driving techniques. You need 14 correct answers on the road sign part and 28 correct answers on the second part. The Indiana BMV test is generally considered medium hard. Failure rate is estimated to 30%. The Indiana knowledge test is offered on a walk-in basis. No appointment is needed unless you need assistance when taking the test. Appointments for applicants who are deaf or hard of hearing can be made by a branch manager or by calling the BMV's Contact Center. You are expected to finish your test within 45 minutes, but there is no official time limit. If you fail the knowledge exam you must wait until the next business day before taking the test again. The Indiana knowledge test is available in: Arabic, Burmese, Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Korean, Polish, Punjabi, Russian, Simplified Chinese, Spanish, and Vietnamese. By preparing 3 or 4 weeks ahead of the real test, you have a better chance of passing the first time. Read the manual at least twice. Take many practice tests and discuss traffic rules with friends and family. Remember: when you apply for a learner's permit or driver's license, you must prepare your documents. BMV will ask for the following: The most common documents you can use to prove your identity include an original U.S. birth certificate, unexpired United States passport, and foreign passport with a visa and I-94 form (checkout this list with approved documents). It is best to bring your Social Security card. However, you can also show a W-2 form or a pay stub with your name and Social Security number. Your legal status is usually shown on your U.S. birth certificate or unexpired passport. Still, if you were born abroad or hold a foreign passport, you must show proof of legal presence, like an unexpired visa. The easiest way to prove residency is to get a statement from your bank/credit card company and a utility bill with your name and address. Pay stubs are also a common way of proving your Indiana residency. Documents must not be older than 60 days when you visit a BMV branch. If you cannot provide two original documents proving your Indiana residency, you may submit an Indiana Residency Affidavit instead. The affidavit must be signed by an individual at least 18 years of age and with whom you reside. The individual signing an Indiana Residency Affidavit must present their unexpired Indiana driver's license or identification card, one document proving identity, and two documents proving their Indiana residency. The Learner's Permit allows you to practice driving before you get a full driver's license. BMV may issue a learner's permit if you are at least 15 and enrolled in an approved behind-the-wheel training course. To get a learner's permit without enrolling in or completing a driver's education course, you must be 16 or older. With a learner's permit, you must always drive under the supervision of a licensed driver. The supervising driver must meet certain requirements. For details, please visit the BMV website. The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) requires individuals seeking a learner's permit to pass a written knowledge exam. This exam is designed to assess a new driver's understanding of essential traffic laws and their ability to recognize and interpret road signs. Frequently Asked Questions For a learner's permit, you can apply at the age of 15 if you are enrolled in an approved behind-the-wheel training course. Alternatively, if you don't complete a driver's education course, you must be 16 years of age or older. At the age of 16 years and 90 days, you can obtain a probationary driver's license after you have completed an approved driver education program. For those who have not completed an approved driver education program, the minimum age to obtain a probationary driver's license is 16 years and 270 days. For a standard driver's license, you must be 21 years old. Generally, you don't schedule an appointment for the BMV written test. Simply choose an Indiana BMV branch and make sure to arrive at least 30 minutes before closing time to complete the exam. However, if you require an interpreter for a language not provided by the BMV, you will need to schedule an appointment online. Ensure you bring the following documents: Proof of identity. Provide legal proof of the name change if your current name is different due to marriage, adoption, etc. One lawful status document (such as a U.S. birth certificate or U.S. passport). Proof of Social Security Number. Two proofs of residency. If you cannot provide two residency documents, you have the option to submit an Indiana Residency Affidavit. Certificate of driver education course (if applicable). If you are a minor, an adult must sign the back of the application for the Agreement on Financial Liability. The BMV written test in Indiana is available in various languages, including American Sign Language, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Polish, Punjabi, Russian, Simplified Chinese, Spanish, and Vietnamese. If you speak a language not offered by the BMV, you should arrange for an interpreter yourself and make an appointment online for the exam. The Indiana BMV test comprises 50 questions divided into two parts. The first part covers 34 questions about traffic rules and laws, while the second part includes 16 questions about road signs. All questions are multiple-choice, so be sure to read them carefully before providing your answers. To pass, you are allowed to miss up to 8 questions (6 general questions and 2 traffic sign questions). Stay focused during the exam and take the time to review your answers to minimize errors and pass the test on the first attempt. Learner's permit restrictions: The use of any telecommunications device is prohibited, unless for calling 911. If you are under 16 years of age and enrolled in a driver education program, you are allowed to drive only under the supervision of a driving instructor seated next to you. Additionally, you may drive with a licensed driver aged 25 or older who is a member of your family or with your spouse who must be at least 21 years old. Probationary driver's license restrictions: The use of any telecommunications device is prohibited, unless for calling 911. During the first 180 days after obtaining your probationary driver's license, you are not allowed to drive with passengers unless accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 25 years old, your spouse who must be at least 21 years old, or a driver instructor. During the first 180 days after obtaining your probationary driver's license, driving is forbidden between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. After this period, further restrictions apply - from Sunday to Thursday after 11 p.m. - from Monday to Friday before 5 a.m. - during the weekend between 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. Exceptions to these restrictions include situations related to work, school, or religious events, or if you are accompanied by an adult with a valid driver's license aged 25, or your spouse who must be at least 21. Learner's permits are valid for two years. You can renew your permit starting 30 days before the expiration date. If you renew it after more than 180 days since your last knowledge test, you will need to retake the exam. If you fail your BMV written test, you must wait until the next day to make another attempt. Before trying again, carefully study the rules of the road and memorize road signs. The learner's permit test consists of 34 multiple choice questions in addition to 16 questions related to road signs. To receive a passing grade on the examination you must correctly answer twenty-eight out of thirty-four questions, and fourteen out of sixteen of the road sign questions. In order to apply for your permit, the State of Indiana requires that you provide the following documents: Proof of identity Social Security card Proof of Indiana residency Proof of citizenship or legal presence Proof of enrollment in driver's training/ necessary fees (\$9 for a learner's permit, as of this writing) A parent or guardian's signature on an agreement of financial liability When you submit your application for your permit, you have ninety days or three attempts to successfully complete the written test. If you fail the test within ninety days you are allowed to retake it two more times, though usually you will have to wait one day between attempts and you may be charged a reexamination fee each time. If you fail the test three times or wait longer than ninety days to retake it, then the application will be closed and you'll have to repeat the process from the beginning. In general, obtaining a learner's permit is not a difficult process. Students who have studied the Indiana Driver's Handbook in its entirety rarely have any problem passing the test, and for extra assurance an excellent idea is take one or more of the free practice tests that are available online. All of the questions that appear on the learner's permit test are found in the Indiana Driver's Handbook, which is also available for free download from the Indiana BMV website. The answers to these questions are also found in the handbook, so reading this book cover to cover is your best bet to ensure you achieve a passing score. There are two categories of questions found on the test. The first essentially deals with the "rules of the road", and covers a wide range of information to include: Driving laws (liability insurance laws, alcohol-related laws, pedestrian laws, implied-consent laws) The penalties for violating these laws Various kinds of maneuvering (turning, signaling, lane changing, and parking) Differences between highway driving and city driving, including speed limits Procedures to be used in accidents or emergencies The second category deals specifically with the different types of road signs. Questions from this category may include: The four basic uses for signs (indicating hazard, providing guidance, providing information, and regulating traffic) and which color is used for each Distinguishing various signs and their meaning based on color and shape The uses for pavement markings on both highways and streets, and the ways in which they restrict the actions of drivers The written examination can be taken at any of your local driver's license offices. The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) is in charge of issuing driver's licenses and a list of all DL offices statewide can be found on their website. Once you've found a suitable office, completed an application and paid your fees, the test will be administered electronically on the computer and the results will be processed immediately upon completion. If under 16, you'll also need to enroll in a BMV-authorized behind-the-wheel training program. The test includes 50 multiple-choice questions covering material outlined in the state's Indiana BMV 2025 Driver's Manual. To pass, you must score at least 84% (42 out of 50 questions). There are online testing options for those under 21. Failing the test requires a retest fee, and after the third attempt, a two-week waiting period applies. The Learner's Permit is the first phase of Indiana's Graduated Driver's License (GDL) program for drivers under 18. To apply, you must be at least 15 years old and enrolled in a driver's education course. Without driver's education, you'll have to wait until you're 16. With a permit, you can drive with a licensed driver (age 25+) or a spouse (age 21+). You must log 50 hours of supervised driving, including 10 at night. At 16 years and 90 days old (with driver's ed) or 16 years and 270 days old (without), you can take a driving skills test for a probationary license, which has nighttime and passenger restrictions. After 180 days and reaching 18 years of age, you can apply for a restricted driver's license. If you're 18 or older, most GDL phases don't apply. You'll still need to meet the requirements for a Learner's Permit and pass the road skills test without GDL-mandated practice hours or driver's education. Once you're ready to apply for the permit, visit the BMV with proof of identity (birth certificate, passport), Social Security card, and two proofs of residence (utility bill, bank statement). Applicants under 16 need proof of BMV-approved behind-the-wheel enrollment and, if under 18, signed consent (in person) from a parent or legal guardian. (Note: If you're under 18, the BMV will not issue you a permit or license if you have been judged a habitual truant or dropout from school.)
